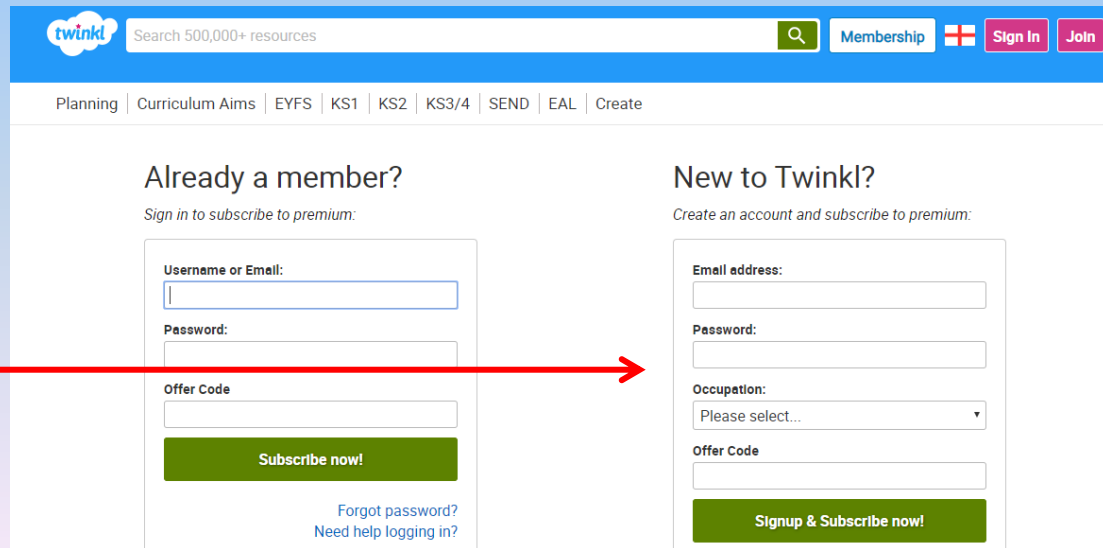
Accessing Twinkl

English Learning

This week for English we are going to look at a fun way of writing poetry by learning about and writing Kennings poems. Kennings poem are a type of riddle where you describe something without saying what it is and the reader has to guess what you are writing about. The poems have short 3 word lines and use verbs to describe what the poem is about.

Activity 1: To begin with have a look through the following slides and learn about what a Kennings poem is and how they are written. Have fun!

Poem writing, Brain hurting, Thought provoking

KENNINGS

What is it ?

A kenning is a way of describing something using clues rather than just saying what it is.

Each line is two words long.

A heat giver
A light maker



The word kenning comes from a Viking phrase which means:

"to express a thing in terms of
another"



It is like a 'mini riddle' used to describe something

Here is an example of a kenning about a cat:

A paw licker
A day dreamer
A milk drinker
A ball chaser
A dog hater
A mouse chaser
A stroke lover

these kennings are describing

A water drinker

A straw eater

A strong walker

A race runner



A ball chaser

A crowd pleaser

A fast runner

A sneaky diver

How do I write one ?

It is not as hard as it seems.

Remember:

To start each kenning with A

A night flyer,
A mouse eater,
A silent swooper



Remember:

To use verbs to describe the object
further

A night **flyer**,

A mouse **eater**,

A silent **swooper**



And if you want a challenge use
alliteration

A night flyer,
A mouse eater,
A silent swooper



Think about what the subject does....
For example a wolf

- ✓ Comes out at night
- ✓ Eats meat
- ✓ Hunts its prey
- ✓ Lives in the woods
- ✓ Howls at the moon

This becomes.....

A night mover
A meat eater
A prey hunter
A wood dweller
A moon howler



Activity 2: Now that you have seen how to write a kennings poem, have a go yourself. Use the example of the wolf kennings poem to help you. Firstly think of something you want to write about. It could be your favourite animal, book, sport, season or person. Then write down a list of things that describe that thing. Then turn each description into a line of the poem. So with the wolf the description 'comes out at night' became 'A night mover' in the poem.

Remember

- Each line begins with A and then has 2 more words.
- Your poem should be about 5-6 lines.
- Each line of the poem starts on a new line of your page.
- To use verbs to explain what your chosen thing does.

If you can try and write more than one Kennings Poem about different things.

Activity 3: Write your poem or poems into your best handwriting and add an illustration. Then read your poem to someone in your house and see if they can guess what it is about. You could maybe even call or video call someone in another house, for example your grandparents, and see if they can guess. Good luck!

You can either use the food cards and the worksheet, print them out and stick the food cards on the right place on the worksheet

Or use the notebook to play an interactive game sorting the food.

Remember some foods are more tricky! Think about products such as milk that come from an animal or foods that are made from part of a plant. Are there any foods that come from both? What about a strawberry yoghurt?

Activity 3: On a large sheet of paper draw a plate with your favourite meal on, remember to include a drink and a pudding. Then label all of the different foods you have included. Next to each label write whether that piece of food comes from a plant or an animal. Remember some foods are tricky. A pizza has flour in the base that comes from a wheat plant, tomato in the sauce which comes from a tomato plant and cheese on top which is made from milk, which comes from a cow!!



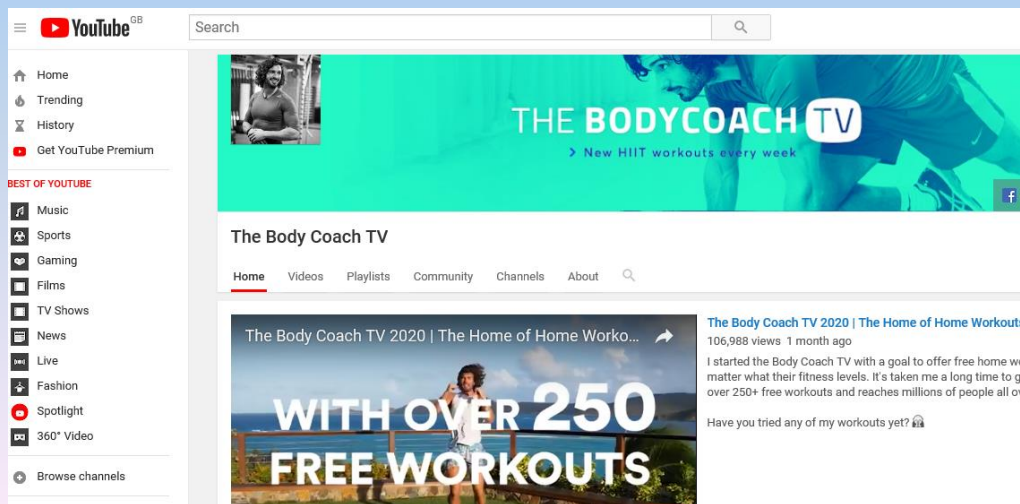

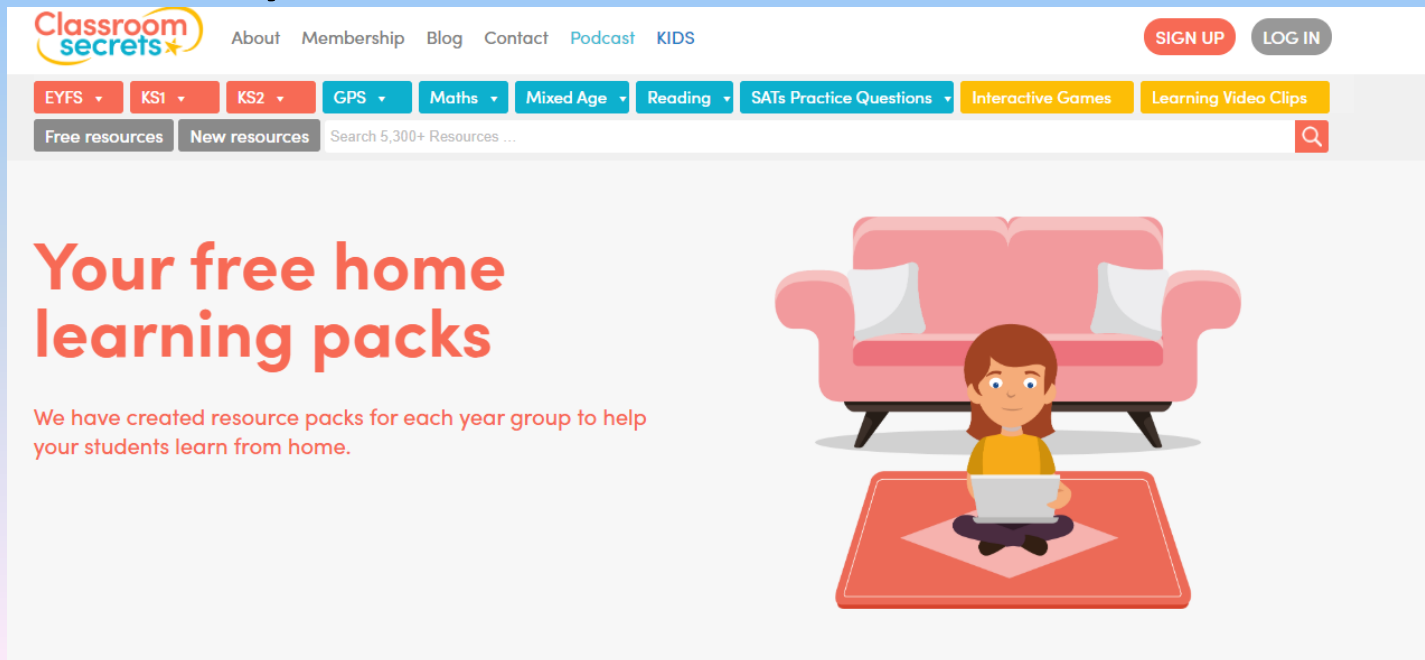
