Hello Year 1!

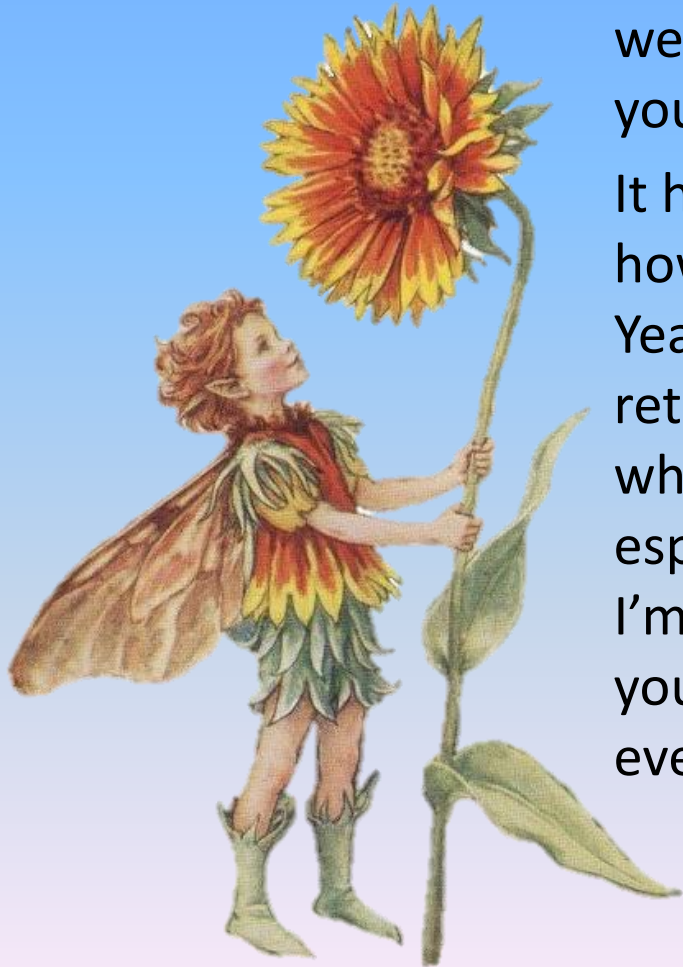
How are you all doing?

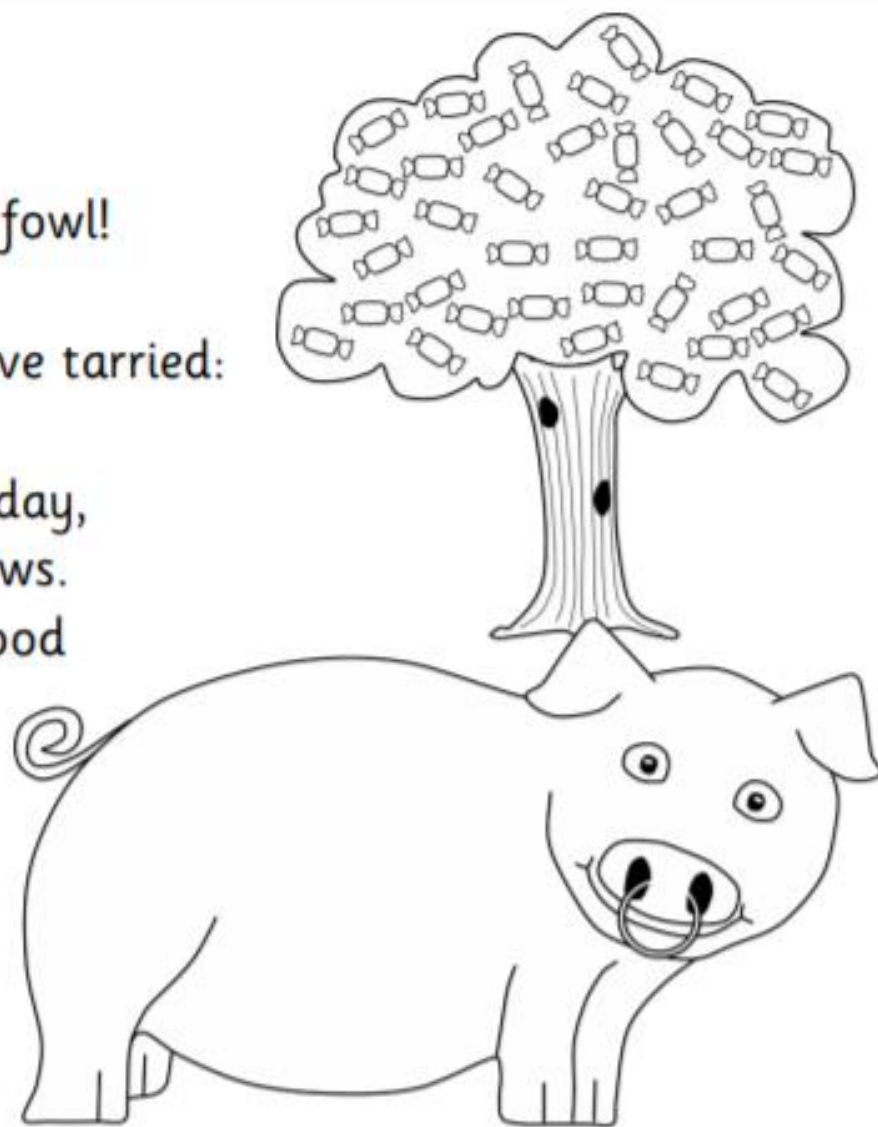
If you guessed

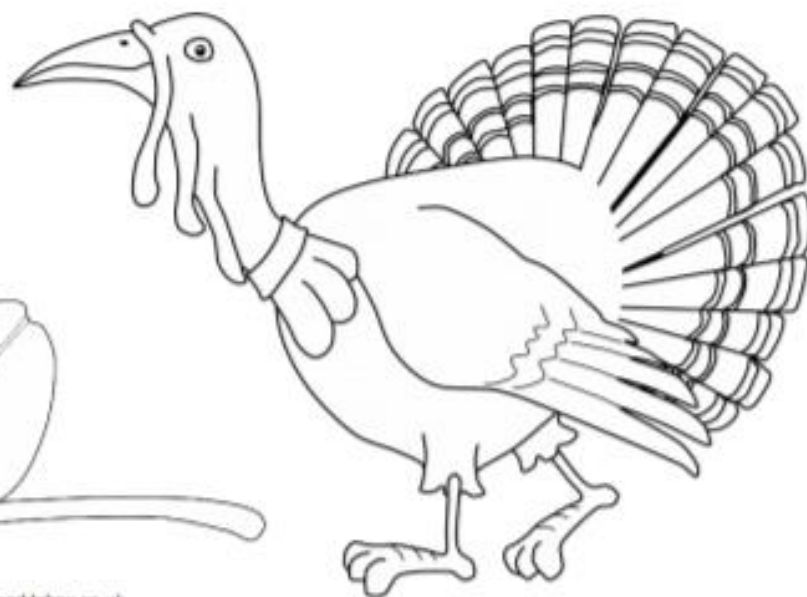
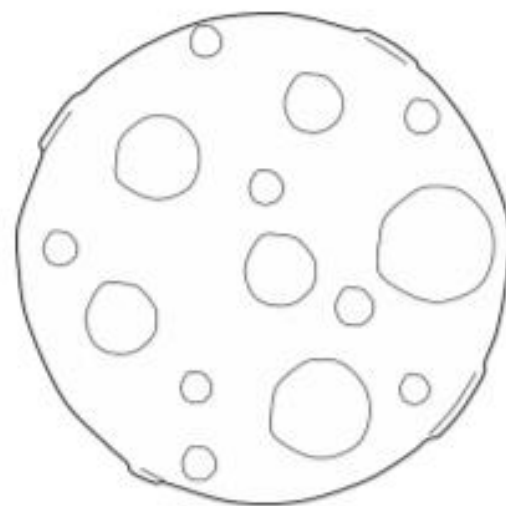

We are going to think about **nouns**, **verbs** and **adjectives** today.

Nouns are words for things – if you can draw a picture of it or point to it, it is a noun.

Verbs are doing words – if you can act it out, it is a verb.

Adjectives are describing words.

Look on the next slides for some examples.

Your job today is to find examples of each type of word in our poem “The Owl and the Pussycat”. You could draw a table (or print the one below) and make lists of the different types of words, or you could print out a copy of the poem and highlight the words in different colours – you would need to decide which colour to use for nouns, which for verbs and which for adjectives and make yourself a key. 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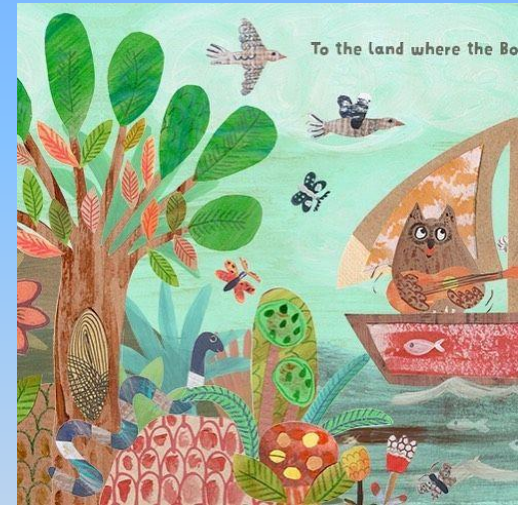
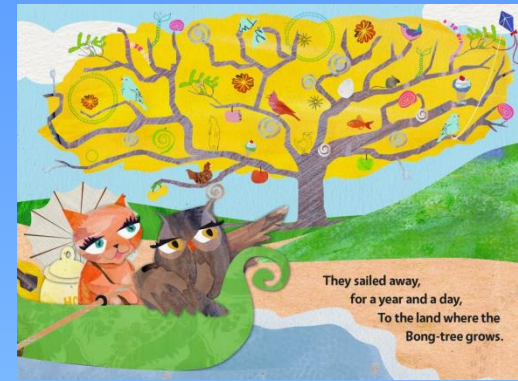

In the poem, the Owl and the Pussycat travel to “the land where the Bong-tree grows.” Can you imagine what it is like there? What does a Bong-tree look like? It sounds magical. Maybe it is sparkly. Or fluffy. Or colourful. Or really bendy. Or maybe it grows feathers. Or sweets.

Make a picture of what you think “The Land where the Bong-tree grows” looks like. You could draw, paint or collage. Or you could build a model or use a computer painting programme.

As you are making your picture or model, think of some adjectives to describe it. When you have finished, write some sentences using your adjectives to describe “The Land where the Bong-tree grows”.



Maths Learning 1

Recognising coins



Try and collect one of each different UK coin. Look closely at them. How are they the same? How are they different? How could you sort them? Look at the colours. Look at the shapes. We can use our knowledge of counting in 2s, 5s and 10s to help us count money.

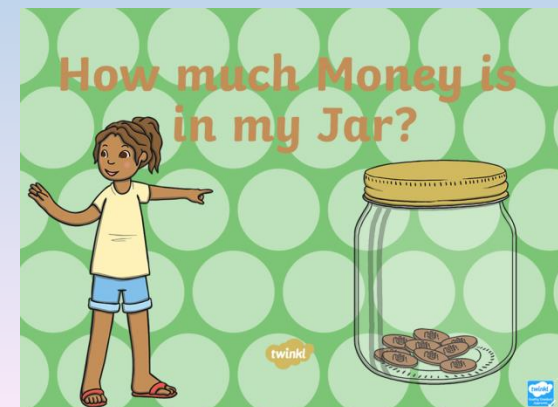

Alex has 2 silver coins.

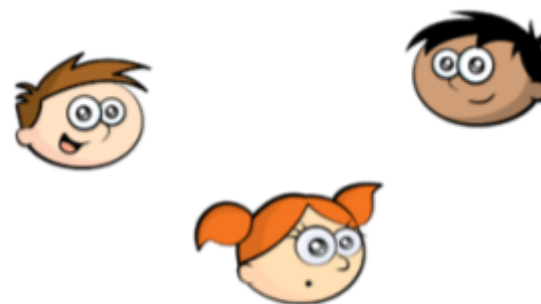

Identifying flowers

When I was your age I learned all about flower names because I loved the Flower Fairy books. You can meet all the Flower Fairies at www.flowerfairies.com and they can help with your identification. Try the Summer fairies or the Garden fairies (or the Wayside fairies if you found wild flowers when you were out and about).

If you get really inspired you could try making up some flower fairies of your own, or maybe make some fairy fashions from real flower petals.

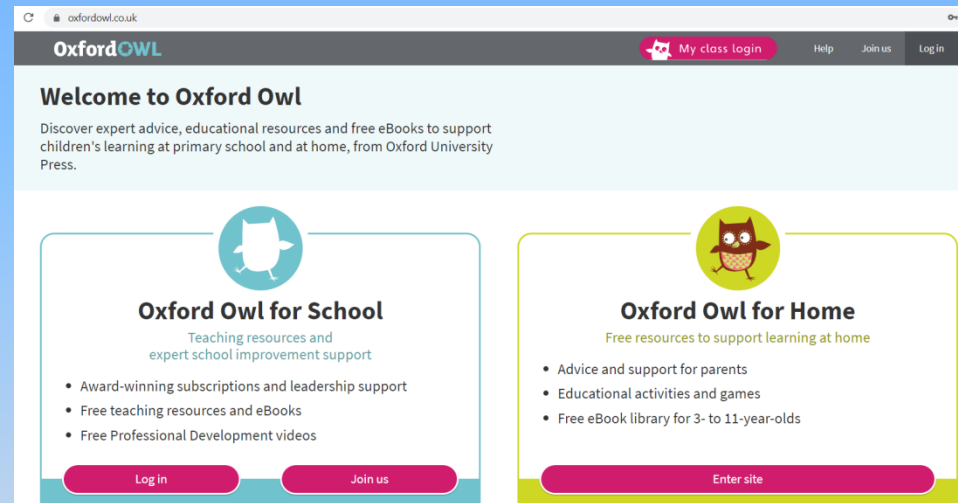

Mrs Child's Phonics group are currently working on Phase 5c (alternative ways of writing sounds we already know e.g. ai, ay, a_e all make the same sound).

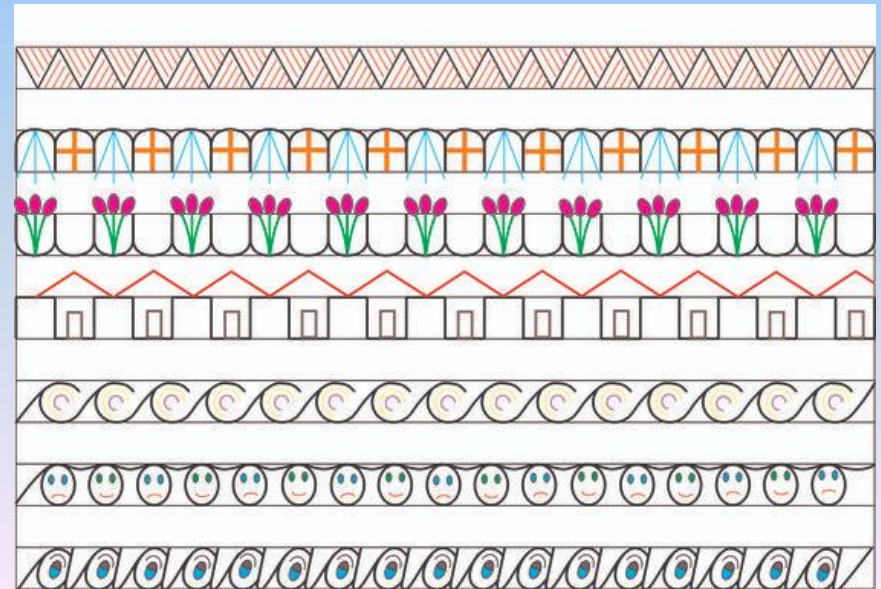
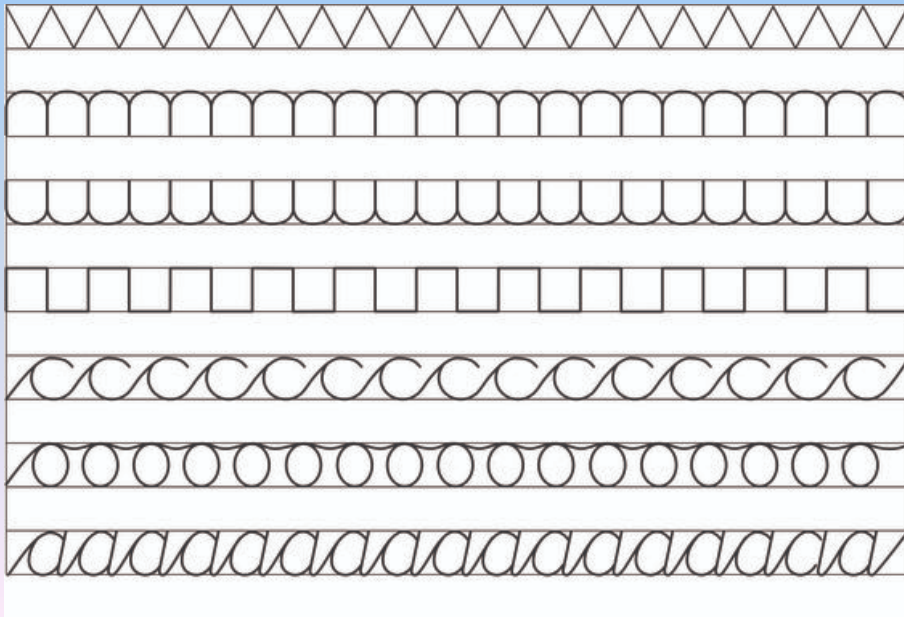
Mrs Smith's group are working on Phase 4.

Writing

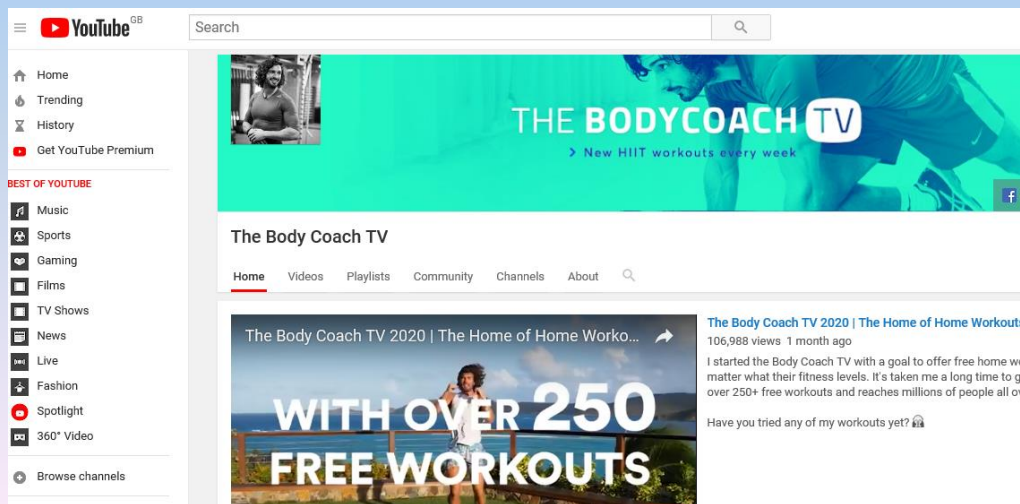

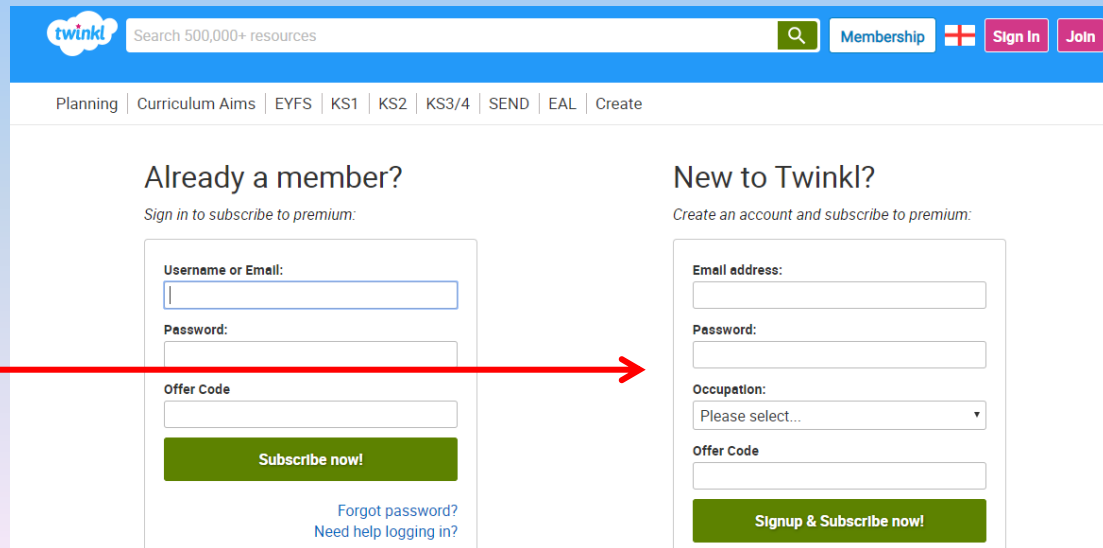
Accessing Twinkl
