What a strange term! It seems forever ago that we were all together in school. We still miss you very much. Here are some possible activities that you can do over the half term.

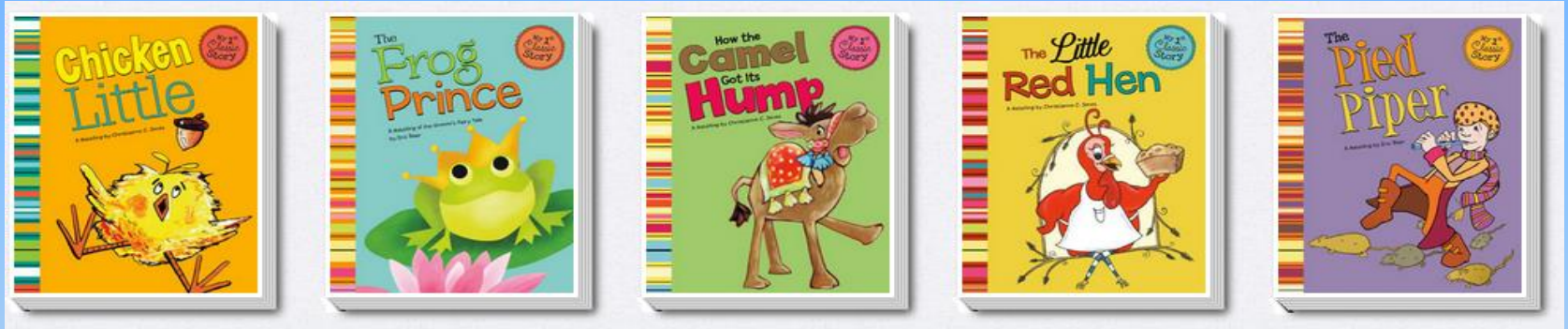
Have a nice break this week and hopefully there is more sunshine on the way to encourage you to have fun outside. Stay safe!
